Zoë Robinson:NSW Advocate for Children and Young People

Network is excited to have Zoë the NSW Advocate for Children and Young People, officially open our 2022 conference.

Zoë was appointed as the Acting Advocate in 2020 and appointed, by the Governor of NSW, as Advocate for a five year term in January 2021. Excitingly, Zoe is the youngest Advocate appointed in Australia.

In two of what could be described as most challenging years young people in this State have faced, Zoë and the ACYP team have engaged with and heard feedback from close to 15,000 children and young people from all corners of NSW.

Voice is at the very heart of Zoë's work, she raises the collective voices of children and young people to decision makers to ensure that policy and service delivery are developed in the best interests of those she serves.

She puts a particular focus on the most vulnerable young members of our communities, she listens to young people in juvenile justice, in out-of-home care, young people experiencing homelessness, children and young people with disability and Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander children and young people and uses their voice to incite positive change for all children and young people.

She firmly believes that children and young people should be given every opportunity to thrive and set themselves up for success, and that they should have the opportunity to choose what that means to them.



The evolution of a play culture: Camp Hill OSHC

In 2015 some of the Camp Hill OSHC team visited an Adventure Playground in Germany and their perspectives on the capabilities and capacities of children changed forever. Since that time the entire team at Camp Hill OSHC have been on a journey of discovery, challenges and revelations. Learn from Angus Gorrie, Camp Hill OSHC's Educational Leader as he unpacks the evolution of this culture, the onboarding of staff and stakeholders, the perceptive challenges and barriers and how this all looks when paralleled with the My Time Our Place framework and National Quality Standards. Angus hopes that by sharing the hurdles as well as the joys others can avoid some of the trial and error and ensure a smoother road for anyone interested in practice of this kind. Finally, hear the many reasons why this evolution has been of incredible benefit to the hundreds of children, and practitioners, that call the Camp Hill OSHC Adventure Playground their second home.

As a playworker and play advocate, Angus Gorrie is passionate about providing authentic play opportunities for children, wherever they may be, and pushing back against increased play deprivation and play bias. Angus has qualifications in Behavioural and Social Sciences, and Playwork. He also spends his day as a practitioner working in a large Adventure Playground. It is this experience and the stories that come with working in a practical setting, combined with the theory and knowledge of study that shapes and guides Angus's perspectives and points of view.

Learning Lab: 10 Resilience Building Blocks for today's children

Are you worried, confused or concerned about being an Educator in today's chaotic world? Children need to have certain basic experiences to build the competencies that will help them manage life – the good, the bad and the ugly. Plenary Sessions:





Dr Bruce Hurst:

Research Fellow Graduate School of Education Doctor of Philosophy The University of Melbourne

Bruce's primary research interests relate to participatory research methodologies to understand children's views about Outside School Hours Care settings. He finds great value in poststructural theories as a way of disrupting 'taken for granted' assumptions in Outside School Hours Care. Bruce is a prolific writer on topics relevant to OOSH including professional standards, re-conceptualising older children in OOSH and the important role OOSH plays in providing children with play and leisure activities to assist their development.

Rethinking children's voices in OOSH. Can... should consultations with children be playful?

This session invites delegates to re-think how you consult with children. It looks at the binaries of adult/child and work/play that dominate Western thought and contemplates whether these influence the ways we conduct our consultations. This presentation asks you to contemplate whether we can disrupt binary thinking and find more playful ways to seek children's views. After all, OOSH is all about play and leisure, so why can't consultation be playful too?



Dr Jennifer Cartmel:

Associate Professor -Child, Youth and Family Practice School of Health Sciences and Social Work Griffith University

Dr Jennifer Cartmel is Network's Ambassador. Dr Cartmel is the Program Director of Human Services Programs (Undergraduate and Postgraduate) at Griffith University, and senior lecturer in the School of Health Sciences and Social Work. She has been involved in a wide range of research projects focusing on: children's social and emotional learning, the workforce in children's services including child care settings and human service organisations.

Most recently Dr Cartmel has been part of the team reviewing, drafting and testing the updated national learning framework, 'My Time Our Place', for OOSH. Dr Cartmel will present the team's progress and share some of the proposed recommendations. She will also discuss the update and the impact of children's contributions.

Dr Cartmel's plenary session will unpack the process and progress of the national learning framework, My Time Our Place. Jennifer will be able to share the team's experiences, the importance of the children's voices who were invited to contribute and what we can expect of the new framework.
